

HOW IS SUNDAY MORNING WORSHIP DIFFERENT DURING LENT?

Did you notice that the cover of this service leaflet says today is the Second Sunday IN Lent? Most of the liturgical seasons use the preposition "of" like the First Sunday OF Advent, etc. If you count the days from Ash Wednesday to Easter, the number will be 46, not 40. All Sundays are considered Feast Days, celebrations of Easter, not Fast Days, so the Sundays during the season of Lent aren't considered bound by the rigors of Lenten observance. Therefore, Sundays during Lent are considered "in" not "of." Confused? Read on . . .

While we *celebrate* the risen Christ on these Lenten Sundays, at St. Peter's we try to observe some of the Liturgical options available to make these Sundays stand out from those of the rest of the year. Last week, the First Sunday in Lent, we began with the Great Litany. This allencompassing intercessory prayer was the first English language rite written by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer and was first published in 1544. It has been found in all Prayer Books of the Anglican Communion ever since. During the remaining Sundays in Lent, we begin the services with the Penitential Rite, which moves the Confession of Sin and Absolution to the beginning.

Throughout Lent, we drop the use of the word "Alleluia" which is a Jewish "praise-shout" meaning "Praise Yaweh" or "Praise the Lord." Its return on Easter heightens our celebration of the Risen Christ.

Music in Lenten services is more subdued. Hymns are often more reflective in nature, and during the choral services, the psalm is sung to Gregorian chant. This morning, the Kyrie, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei will be sung by the choir alone in a beautiful setting by English composer Herbert Sumsion, allowing the congregation a moment for participation by listening. Because today is March 17th, the actual feast day of St. Patrick, the Postcommunion Hymn at the 10am service will be "I bind unto myself today." The text is attributed to St. Patrick, and the two tunes are both Irish tunes.

Next week, we will consider the traditions of the church's use of color and other adornments to highlight the change of liturgical seasons.



March 17, 2019 – Lent 2 (C) Life Transformed: The Way of Love in Lent - PRAY

Drawing on the ancient practice of setting aside Lent as a period of study and preparation for living as a Christian disciple, we are pleased to present weekly teachings from Life Transformed: The Way of Love in Lent. Learn more at episcopalchurch.org/life-transformed.

READ Exodus 14:10-15:1

The story of the Exodus is one of the most important baptismal stories in the whole Bible. In the blessing over the water, which we PRAY at every baptism, we remember that the Hebrews were liberated from bondage in Egypt through water. Exodus is also the only reading that is specifically required in the Easter Vigil because of the way God delivered Israel through the Red Sea and the pillar of fire that lit the way for God's people. That pillar is echoed in the Easter fire, which shines in our darkness at the vigil. The Exodus event holds a seminal place in the recitation of God's liberating action – the common thread woven throughout the vigil and the Bible itself.

One of the most intriguing aspects of this powerful story is the way prayer has been woven through every step the Israelites took in their path to liberation. When they were afraid and even doubted, their prayer was heard by God who told them that he would not abandon them. When they were about to be overtaken by the Egyptians, their prayer for deliverance was answered. Moses was given the power to part the sea, and they crossed on dry land. Finally, when they were safe, the prophet Miriam led a prayer of rejoicing and thanksgiving with song and dancing. Each of these prayers is important to the story and to the relationship built between God and God's people.



THE WAY OF LOVE Practices for Jesus-Centered Life

In the early Church, Lent was a time for catechumens (those who were preparing to be baptized) to learn about the Christian life. The outline of the faith that they would follow was called a catechism, and we still have a similar form in our Book of Common Prayer today (pp. 845-862). In particular, our catechism describes the role of prayer in Christian life, including the seven types of prayer:

- Adoration: We lift up our hearts and minds to God, asking nothing but to enjoy God's presence.
- Praise: We praise God, not to obtain anything, but because God's Being draws praise from us.
- Thanksgiving: We offer gratitude to God for all the blessings of this life, for our redemption, and for whatever draws us closer to God.
- Penitence: In penitence, we say we are sorry, confess our sins, and make amends and life change wherever possible.
- Oblation: We offer ourselves, our lives and labors, in union with Christ, for God's purposes.
- Intercession: We bring before God the needs of others.
- Petition: We present our own needs, that God's will may be done.

Each of these forms of prayer will help you grow and bring you into a closer relationship with God. In fact, Scripture tells us that even when we don't know how to pray, "the Holy Spirit will intercede for us" and teach our heart how to pray in "sighs too deep for words" (Romans 8:26).

REFLECT: *Prayer* is one of the essential components of walking the Way of Love. Yet, some people can find it intimidating, frustrating, or hard to practice. Which of the prayer styles from the catechism speak to you? Is there one that comes naturally?

The Lessons

The First Lesson: Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18

The word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." But Abram said, "O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." But the word of the Lord came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness. Then he said to him, "I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess." But he said, "O Lord God, how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He said to him, "Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away. As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him. When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, "To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates."

The Celebrant continues

It is very meet, right, and our bounden duty, that we should at all times, and in all places, give thanks unto thee, O Lord, holy Father, almighty, everlasting God; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who was in every way tempted as we are, yet did not sin; by whose grace we are able to triumph over every evil, and to live no longer unto ourselves, but unto him who died for us and rose again.
