The Lessons

The First Lesson: 1 Kings 8:22-30, 41-43

Solomon stood before the altar of the LORD in the presence of all the assembly of Israel, and spread out his hands to heaven. He said, "O LORD, God of Israel, there is no God like you in heaven above or on earth beneath, keeping covenant and steadfast love for your servants who walk before you with all their heart, the covenant that you kept for your servant my father David as you declared to him; you promised with your mouth and have this day fulfilled with your hand. Therefore, O LORD, God of Israel, keep for your servant my father David that which you promised him, saying, 'There shall never fail you a successor before me to sit on the throne of Israel, if only your children look to their way, to walk before me as you have walked before me.' Therefore, O God of Israel, let your word be confirmed, which you promised to your servant my father David. "But will God indeed dwell on the earth? Even heaven and the highest heaven cannot contain you, much less this house that I have

built! Regard your servant's prayer and his plea, O LORD my God, heeding the cry and the prayer that your servant prays to you today; that your eyes may be open night and day toward this house, the place of which you said, 'My name shall be there,' that you may heed the prayer that your servant prays toward this place. Hear the plea of your servant and of your people Israel when they pray toward this place; O hear in heaven your dwelling place; heed and forgive. "Likewise when a foreigner, who is not of your people Israel, comes from a distant land because of your name -- for they shall hear of your great name, your mighty hand, and your outstretched arm-- when a foreigner comes and prays toward this house, then hear in heaven your dwelling place, and do according to all that the foreigner calls to you, so that all the peoples of the earth may know your name and fear you, as do your people Israel, and so that they may know that your name has been invoked on this house that I have built."

For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. Therefore take up the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to withstand on that evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm. Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints. Pray also for me, so that when I speak, a message may be given to me to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it boldly, as I must speak.

August 23, 2015—Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost (B) Hurricane Katrina Tenth Anniversary

Ten years ago, on August 29, 2005, Hurricane Katrina slammed into the US Gulf Coast as a Category 3 storm. Over 1,800 people lost their lives, and one million were displaced from their homes, some for years following the storm and others permanently.

In the aftermath, Episcopal churches organized food and volunteers, providing pastoral care as well as links to relief and recovery services. Regionally, churches hosted and cared for evacuees, aiding them in finding temporary housing and employment. Long-term program partnerships in Louisiana and Mississippi helped people rebuild their lives and revitalize their neighborhoods through case management, gutting and rebuilding homes and making mortgages accessible and manageable. Hurricane Katrina also marked the beginning of what is now Episcopal Relief & Development's US Disaster Program, which equips and inspires Episcopal congregations to increase their resilience and care for their vulnerable neighbors. Commemorating the tenth anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, Episcopal Relief & Development presents its #Katrina10 story series, offering in-depth perspectives from area residents as well as the organization's partners and staff. These stories unfold through the month of August on Episcopal Relief & Development's 75th Anniversary story section: http://www.episcopalrelief.org/75stories. Hurricane Katrina transformed The Episcopal Church's understanding of its potential role after emergencies, and it also transformed how congregations view mission, outreach and membership. A new initiative, Called to Transformation, helps congregations identify and utilize their gifts to enhance local ministry and mission. Churches are celebrating these ministries on the Episcopal Asset Map, a searchable online tool that shows the locations and strengths of thousands of Episcopal institutions.

"There is a growing awareness in The Episcopal Church of how an asset-based approach can unlock potential and inspire action, not only in a disaster response context but in responding to everyday challenges and creating thriving communities," said Katie Mears, Director of Episcopal Relief & Development's US Disaster Program. "Hurricane Katrina put a spotlight on problems that we continue to struggle with, but it also showed us how to create solutions. I think we honor those whose lives were impacted by Katrina when we build strong, diverse communities that care for those most vulnerable."

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A Farewell Letter from Bishop Chilton Knudsen

My first exposure to Long Island was a project in 6th grade geography class. On a strip of newsprint paper, I sketched this island, from the East River to the eastern forks, and filled it with little gold stars where various towns were located. I practiced the names for the oral presentation of my project: Ronkonkoma. Wyandanch, Patchogue, Islip, Copiague, Massapequa (the teacher gave me a C- for the oral presentation; her alma mater was Hofstra, and her standards were high).

I finally learned how to say "Ronkonkoma" when, at Bishop Provenzano's generous invitation, I arrived in September 2014 to serve as Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Long Island. I've learned ever so much more since that first trip over the Throg's Neck Bridge:

- 1. This diocese is the most diverse of any region in the Episcopal Church. Los Angeles and Miami and Washington DC don't even come close.
- 2. I understand now why people want to live in Brooklyn; it's full of life and variety and history.
- 3. I totally get why people leave their homelands to live in Queens, where every street scene is a small version of the United Nations.
- 4. Having lived in Maine for 18 years, I thought no other coastal areas could flood me with joy, but beaches and waterfront areas here do that. God is everywhere, inland and coastal.
- 5. I learned that my heart can stretch to fully embrace struggling ethnic congregations tucked between storefronts AND congregations in the lap of privilege on prosperous shorefronts.
- 6. I count it as a daily gift of God's grace that all of this diversity co-exists in one diocese, and that our church folk are committed

to living the Gospel, whatever differences there may be.

- 7. I've learned yet again the deep blessing of working with devoted and talented diocesan staff colleagues. Day by day, diocesan staff attends to behind-the-scenes work which may never be known in the larger diocesan community. Particular gratitude is directed to boards and staff of Episcopal Charities and Episcopal Community Services, which have joined to become Episcopal Ministries of Long Island, now poised for a grace-filled future.
- 8. I have been reminded, during our time together, how much I enjoy the ministry of bishop. I have met with you, worshipped with you, joined with you in confirming and receiving people, and socialized with you. You have been wonderfully hospitable when I have come to your parishes for Visitations. Thank you for treating me so well.

It would be wonderful to stay here in the Diocese of Long Island for another season. But God's claim upon my vocational life takes me to the Diocese of Maryland, where I begin as Assistant Bishop in mid-October. I hope you will pray for me and for the Diocese of Maryland.

You will always be in my thoughts and prayers. Thank you, Diocese of Long Island, It has been a huge blessing to join you in ministry.
